





Welcome to our Autumn Newsletter

Dear Friends,

I hope you have had an excellent summer and enjoyed being able to be outside during the weeks of glorious sunny weather.

At the end of the summer, a group of 26 Friends sailed on our 2022 expedition voyage to Spitsbergen and north-east Greenland. We ventured to the far north onboard the ice strengthened passenger vessel M/V Ortelius, operated by Oceanwide Expeditions, between 27 August to 9 September. It was a fantastic journey, with calm seas and beautiful weather. Sailing through the remote and dramatic fjords of Scoresby Sound in east Greenland was a wonderful highlight, as was seeing the shimmering curtains of the Northern Lights on several nights. We were fortunate to see a wide variety of wildlife, including polar bear, humpback and fin whales, Arctic fox and hares, Svalbard reindeer, and were chased off our final landing site by an inquisitive musk ox! We were guided by an excellent Expedition team from Oceanwide Expeditions led by Jan Belgers, and enjoyed fascinating lectures by Professor Julian Dowdeswell, and his wife Evelyn, on the geology and glaciology of the area. We also held a charity auction at the end of the voyage, which raised £3300 for the SPRI Centenary Campaign. Thank you to all the Friends who participated in the voyage. It was great to share such an amazing adventure with you all!

Looking forward, we will end the year with two important events. On 29 October we will be holding the Friends AGM at SPRI and say farewell to Professor Julian Dowdeswell on his retirement from the Institute. This will be our chance to say thank you to Julian for his tremendous work as the Director of SPRI, and for his great support and encouragement for the Friends, over more than 20 years. I hope many of you will attend for what will be a very special occasion. The final event of the year will be the SPRI Centenary Gala Dinner to be held at Robinson

College, Cambridge on 5 November. I know many of the Friends will be attending and coming from near and far, including several from the USA.

Our fund raising for the SPRI Centenary Campaign continues. The latest financial summary, dated end August 2022, shows that we have now raised the grand total of £217,000. 

NEW EVIDENCE for possible liquid water beneath the south polar ice cap of Mars

An international team of researchers, led by Neil Arnold at SPRI, has revealed new evidence for the possible existence of liquid water beneath the south polar ice cap of Mars.

The team, including researchers from the University of Sheffield, the University of Nantes, University College, Dublin, and the Open University used spacecraft laser-altimeter measurements of the shape of the upper surface of the ice cap to identify subtle patterns in its height.

Their results agree with earlier ice-penetrating radar measurements that were originally interpreted to show a potential area of liquid water beneath the ice. There has been debate over the liquid water interpretation from the radar data alone, with some studies suggesting the radar signal is not due to liquid water.

The results, reported in the journal Nature Astronomy, provide the first independent line of evidence, using data other than radar, that there is liquid water beneath Mars' south polar ice cap.


