From the Institute

Since the start of summer I've been to both Greenland and Svalbard. In the beautiful town of Ilulissat on the West Greenland coast, at the request of the UK Hydrographic Office, I gave a talk about UK work on mapping the seafloor of the Arctic at an International Maritime Workshop. The harbour at Ilulissat is especially impressive with its plethora of small boats surrounded by remnants of the huge icebergs that are calved from the nearby Ilulissat or Jakobshavn Glacier.

This glacier, which has a velocity of more than 10 km per year, is one of the most rapidly moving in the world and is a major

contributor of icebergs into Baffin Bay. In Svalbard, I gave several student lectures at the University Centre in Longyearbyen and continued working on several scientific manuscripts. During September in Svalbard, at almost 80 degrees North, I could see the days shortening over the week I was there, and several snowstorms also marked the rapid onset of autumn.

A Polar Safari

Each year sees an event called Open Cambridge where buildings around the city open their doors to the public for events and behind the scenes tours over a weekend in September.

Over the past few years the library and archive have joined together to offer talks and behind the scenes trails. This year we took the theme of Animals at the Poles and our library team devised a Polar Safari.

For those brave enough to venture forth with just a rough map to guide them a

series of way stations provided information on the native and non-native animals to be found in the polar regions. From finding out if polar bears are left handed (or should that be pawed) to the difference in bone structure for penguins (theirs are not hollow. This aids them in swimming by reducing their natural buoyancy) the safari took in everything from scientific studies to children's stories. Just over 60 people took the safari - I am told that all returned safely.

Ross Sea party memorial

The men of Shackleton's Ross Sea party have been brought out of the shadows again thanks to the efforts of Aeneas Mackintosh's irrepressible octogenarian granddaughter, Anne Phillips.

The Ross Sea expedition, a tragic tale of self-sacrifice by men who heroically laid depots for what they believed was Shackleton's advancing party ended in the death of Aeneas Mackintosh, Victor Hayward and the Rev. Arnold Spencer-Smith in 1916. Hayward's death was followed 30 days later by that of his younger brother Stanley, at Passion Wood in Belgium.

Mackintosh's memorial which he shares with his mother Annie and two brothers in the churchyard of St John, Burgess Hill, West Sussex, had fallen into disrepair but with Anne's persistence, it is now put to rights. On the 27th September 2017 she was joined at the graveside by Peter, Victor Hayward's great nephew, and Debby Horsman, the closest living relative of Spencer-Smith.

Diana Cohen-Robinson who had met Anne on Shackleton's Centenary voyage to Antarctica in 2015 flew especially from San Francisco for the occasion.

Last year Peter Hayward saw the fruit of his endeavours when a Blue Plaque was unveiled at 40, Connaught Road, Harlesden, London in honour of his great uncle.

Debby Horsman, whose great-grandfather was Spencer-Smith's uncle, ensures his name burnishes brightly having given some 100 talks to date that raise funds for the Institute. Last year a centenary memorial service for him was held in the Edinburgh church where he was ordained.

Shackleton Auction Takes the Biscuit

As Frank Wild once recorded "Thousands of pounds would not have bought that biscuit" when Shackleton shared a vital biscuit with him.

At Christies in London, September 2011, I bought a Shackleton biscuit rescued from



the hut at Cape Royds dating from the Nimrod Expedition 1907 - 1909 for a princely sum. Little did I know what a journey this little Huntley & Palmer gem would take me on. It captured so many people's imagination that all and sundry wanted to welcome it home, so in the end I did not collect it for 6 long years until Christie's issued their final collection notice.

Similar to Wild, the biscuit has come to symbolise generosity, friendship, collaboration and most of all the power of the imagination. My fellow adventurer Jill Dawes and I took the biscuit from the warehouse into the home of all fine biscuits in London, the grand Fortnum

& Mason, where it even sparked the archivists interest! She's had an epic journey. Like Tom Crean she seems unbreakable!
