This photograph of the Midwinter celebrations was taken in 1911 during Captain Scott's British Antarctic Expedition (known as the *Terra Nova* Expedition, after the ship).

The photograph was taken by Herbert Ponting, the official expedition photographer. The photograph is in black and white and measures: width: 127mm, height: 177mm.

A number of these flags, items of tableware and clothing are now in the collections of the Polar Museum.

DID YOU KNOW?

Antarctic Midwinter celebrations were started over a century ago by Captain Scott and his team. 21 June is the turning point of the Antarctic winter and people working there celebrate as they look forward to the lengthening of the days and the return of sunlight.

Modern Midwinter celebrations still include a special meal, speeches, the awarding of prizes, entertainments, and the giving and receiving of presents. <p>Midwinter in Antarctica is on 21 June. There is no sunlight at all, but the day is special as it signals the turning point in the year. From 22 June onwards the days in the southern hemisphere are longer, eventually sunlight returns to Antarctica.</p>	<p>Research: Why will there be no sunlight in Antarctica on 21 June? What will it be like here on 21 June? Challenge: plan a Midwinter party. Who could you invite? Can you still share the festivities with friends or family who can't be with you in person? Produce invitations, place cards, decorations, flags, bunting, decorate your own plates and cups.</p>	<p>Paper, pencil, string or wool, colouring equipment, <i>internet (optional)</i>. <p>Midwinter is a time of reflection, a chance to think about friends and family far away. Letters are written and opened. Midwinter presents are made for each other from what is to hand.</p>	<p>Think about friends and family that you miss. Write them a letter or record a message. Make a special present for someone else. So that everyone gets a present, randomly allocate names within the group. What does the person you are making for like/dislike? Think about your skills. What could you make?
